MADURAI SEED is a grass root level nonprofit organization founded in 1999, aims to promote underprivileged children and young people through education. "Seed" refers to our belief that every child has great potential, when children and young people are supported with adequate resources and opportunities they can grow and achieve great heights.









To provide a supportive nurturing environment for socially economically disadvantaged children and young people to discover and develop their mental abilities, to enrich their sense of self-esteem, to empower them with emotional stability, and to promote personal and social responsibilities.

Highlights of the year 2018-2019

- Madurai Seed is stepping into 20th year in the educational interventions for the upliftment of underprivileged children and young people.
- In the 2018-2019 educational year, we functioned through 3 children centers, 2 young people center, and 2 hostels. Around 475 children got benefited directly through these evening supplementary education centers.
- 26 Young people got benefited directly.
- **61 students** wrote the public exams in 10,11, and 12th classes. 75% of them are first generation educated.
- 4 young people settled in full time jobs.
- 4 young people are completing under graduation.
- 2 young people are completing their professional courses.
- Madurai Seed's board is shuffled. Karthikbharathi is given Director position, where Elavarasi is the president and Managing Trustee.
- A new website is launched <u>www.maduraiseed.org</u>
- Our programs got attention from lots of Tamil and English newspapers.
- Asha for education and Friends of Madurai Seed has sponsored for a lease of new classroom for children

Vandugal Arangam is an education center for children from classes 1 to 4, aged between 5 to 9 years old. 4 teaching volunteers are there to teach children. "Vandugal" in Tamil means active kids. There are some kindergarten kids also joins

Tamil and English language basics are given more importance in this center like identification of alphabets, sounds, and basic vocabularies. The volunteers do this through rhymes, pictures, stories, and drills. The students also get help in mathematics and school home works. The center functions two hours 6 to 8 in the evening from Monday to Friday. During the weekend, they play games, read stories, and see movies.

Vergal Arangam is a study center for children from classes 5 to 8, aged between 10 to 13 years old. 4 teaching volunteers are there to teach children. "Vergal" in Tamil means roots. This age group children needs to stay rooted in the education system to avoid dropouts.

English and Math classes are given more importance in this center because they are the two subjects children find difficult. The volunteers do this through individual attention giving and clearing the doubts. The students also get help in school home works and tests. The center functions three hours 6 to 9 in the evening from Monday to Saturday. Saturday is a kind of no bag day, on that day children play games, read library books, involve in other creative activities.

Kanavugal Arangam is supplementary education center for children from classes 9 to 12, aged between 14 to 17 years old. 8 teaching volunteers are there to teach children. "Kanavugal" in Tamil means dreams. These adolescent children need more guidance and counselling.

Individual subject wise classes are given importance because 10,11,12th std are attending board exams. In these classes, the students have to identify their skills, study interest, and career interests. They have to choose different subject disciplines for 11th and 12th std. These children also are taking part in all the extra-curricular activities to learn crucial life skills and values. Girl children are encouraged to continue studies and higher education.

4 volunteers go to this boy's hostel to assist the children in school subjects. The boys are from various villages and slums around Madurai and study in a public school nearby. The volunteers teach from 7.00 to 8.30 from Monday to Friday. 10th std students are given special training for Maths and English.

There were children who lacked basic reading, writing in both Tamil, English, and simple arithmetic skills. Initial oral and written tests were given and identified such students from 6th to 9th std. If this lacking continues, the students suffer to pass 10th std and chances are high they will leave academic streams. So, special classes were given to them regularly. They were given basic classes sounds, alphabets, simple vocabularies, etc. Now, they are showing great improvement. We also add the hostel students in our public events.



Children Hostel Center



60 male and 50 female
students, totally 110 children
benefited from standard
1 to 5

The children are from classes I to V aged from 5 to 10 years. They are from very poor families around many villages near Madurai. They are very young children need family care and love but they are studying in hostel due to disadvantaged situations. It is a residential school. Our evening classes are from 6 to 7.30 from Monday to Friday.

2 volunteers went to this hostel last year. They assisted the children in learning alphabets, sounds both in Tamil, English and arithmetic operations like addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Children who lacked in basic skills were given extra attention and training. The children are also added in some of our public events and extra-curricular activities.








- Among 25 young people, 15 young people (9 male: 6 female) are first generation college going students.

Thenkoodu Children Bank

Children save their **pocket money** in this bank. They were given **passbooks** and the savings are entered daily. Their savings will be returned to them in the beginning of new educational year with **20% interest** to their amount. This helps their educational expenses and reduce the burden on parents.

Every penny counts



On **11.06.2018**, the savings of the children in the year 2017-2018 were distributed. Parents and Children took part in the event. The children who saved more money in each class were given special encouragement prizes. 96 children saved **Rs. 26, 793**. Madurai Seed added interest of **Rs. 5213**. Totally 32, 006 was distributed to children.

MUTRAM LITERATURE CLUB



Literature is one of the most interesting and significant expressions of humanity

Story Reading: 17.05.2018: Volunteer Arunkumar read **two tamil short stories**, Sokavanam by Dharman, an ecological literature and Minnal by Rajanarayanan, a story of a simple incident in a rural setting. Both stories are enjoyed by children.



Draw a story: 18.05.2018: Two teams were given a board and a handful of colour chalks and markers. They created a story and given an image to that by **drawing the characters**, **places**, and things related to the story. The other team tried to guess the story. At last one of the team members revealed the real story behind the scribbles. Very fun and creative evening.



Story Telling: 21.05.2018: Teacher. **Madurai Saravanan**, interacted with children and young people of Madurai Seed. **Narrated** children's stories connecting it with the current scenario of our country and it was very much enjoyed and felt by the children. They burst out into laughter for his every action for the characters in the story. It was a great evening for us. Girls honoured him with a shawl, a painting and traditional sweets.



Learning Folk Lyrics: 23.09.2018: Let's sing: Children practiced folk songs from various genre in groups. Thanks to the internet, 6 beautiful songs were curated. Volunteers helped children in needful ways synchronized singing and pitch variations. A Tamil lullaby, Song about father's love, Song about mother's love, Fishermen song, Song about women education, Song about poor were elicited and played with traditional music

instruments. Children beautifully rendered their part singing happily, and in the mood what the song required. It was a meaningful, fun-tastic morning.

GALILEO SCIENCE CLUB



The important thing is to never stop questioning

Did you know: 19.05.2018: 20 Madurai seed children and 4 young people attended the



one-day **mega science workshop** organized as Big Bang- Science - A- thon of Let's make Engineering simple. LMES provided hands on experiments to give thorough **practical knowledge** in Science. What is a molecule, how sound waves travel, why we use liquid hydrogen as rocket fuel, how rockets fly high, and so many facts are discussed with kids by Prem Anand from LMES. At the end of the workshop, a science

kit was provided for kids. Mr. **Murugesan Krishnasamy** sponsored us for entry tickets. Madurai Seed kids grabbed this opportunity to learn and see what Science is, and how to apply it. The theoretical explanations in Tamil along with practical applications of many science facts proved a great experience to all.

Periscope Making: 23.05.2018: Children experimented the laws of reflection by making



Periscope with two plain mirrors fixed at 45* degree each at right angles in a thin cardboard box with two eyepieces on its two sides. Children learnt the principle behind submarine ships which use periscope with lenses and mirrors. Videos explained about periscope were screened. Children and young people framed the instrument model, glued its sides to form a rectangular box, fixed the mirrors at correct angles, cut and pasted the eyepieces, finally observed the

objects which are away from direct line-of-sight. They made it simply but enthusiastically, and curiously. They loved doing it using the science kit given away by LMES



Concept Learning: 29.05.2018: Kev concepts in Basic Science discussed by Mr. Sivakumar, a teacher. Understanding the fundamentals helps to see how the whole universe functions. Children gained accurate explanations for science theorems principles, observed illustrations using simple interacted and perceived things. They phenomena related to Physics & Math functions through this lecture.





Experimenting Science facts: 26.08.2018: Experiments, power point presentation, do you know? Q & A, facts and explanations, puzzles, and science related videos screened and presented by students from I to XII std of Madurai Seed. The stage gave them new learning experiences with answers of unknown everyday science facts. The participants involved in discussing science topics from their text book, gathered sources to demonstrate it, and finally presented it with photos and videos. The purpose of conducting science club activities for students is to motivate, think, imagine, communicate about fundamentals science. The interaction makes them build confidence, grow their scientific knowledge, filter their shyness and fear, and so boost their interests towards Science. Various topics were discussed, demonstrated, and explained by students.





Science Seminars: 27.08.2018: Teaching volunteers of Madurai Seed gave seminars on various topics like Rocket science, Airplane technology, Water transport system, bicycle science, hazardous effects of plastics, food colouring chemicals and its effects, science in food, involuntary actions of human mind, CPU and functions of computer, natural disasters, video editing basics, photography techniques and functions, and some common basic science questions were presented with videos, photos series. We really appreciate the teaching volunteers of Madurai Seed for wonderful presentations.





Levitation: 08.09.2019: Mr. Muruges has brought a device along with him. It has a globe and electromagnet unplugged. When he passed electricity to the device, a magic happened, the globe floated. Children exclaimed when he explained that it's not a magic, it's called "Levitation". As the globe has a magnet in it, and the device has electromagnet in it, both generates two opposite forces resulting the globe to float in mid-air. The biggest application of it is Maglev trains which is under process in China, Germany. Maglev levitation's principle, uses, examples were presented by him with clear explanations. Videos on levitation principle, maglev trains were screened. It was followed by another session on future technology of development in which he discussed about 3D printing, Artificial Intelligence, Driverless Cars, IOT, Electric vehicles.





Brain games: 24.09.2018 – Morning: Workouts for brain: Children actively involved in doing puzzles, word building, word scramble, word connection, emoji connection, and lateral thinking exercises. They have participated in these challenges with much enthusiasm in small groups. Quick answers came from young children, when older grade children stretching their brain. Team playing yielded answers. Brain trainers and psychological experiments were really an "edujoyment" for them while playing on screen with iPad.





Sweetness of Maths: 24.09.2018 - Evening: Who dislike Mathematics? Almost 80% hands raised before the session. Volunteer Venkatesh facilitated this session to wire the children's mind in favour of Mathematics. He introduced many short cut methods for multiplication, finding square roots. He showed the time difference between traditional and short cut method. He asked children to come forward and do Maths in the blackboard. At first children hesitated to come, later there was competition between children to go forward. He also asked Maths and lateral thinking puzzles. Many of the puzzles were answered by children. We hope the bitterness and fear towards Mathematics will be eradicated through fun and activity-oriented learning.



Moon Watching: 20.10.2018: Galileo Science Centre, Theni organized this event at Teppakulam, Madurai on a full moon day. They set up two telescopes there, and posters about moon and its connection to earth and the sun. The program is to bring awareness about science among public. Madurai Seed children took part in the event and watched moon through telescopes. Elavarasi helped in setting up the telescope. Many children, men, woman from public watched moon on that day through telescope.





Robotics Basics: 16.11.2018: As far as we have seen robots only in movies, Galileo Science club of Madurai Seed provided answers for: what is robotics, why robotics, how robots execute different functions automatically, what are its components, its types and fields we use. Ms. Jeyapriya from INSPA, Chennai screened slides and videos on robotics. She started with brief note on chip, program, motors, locomotion of a robot. The applications of robot technology, types of robots were understood through videos of her. Interaction let them know about humanoid, non-humanoid robots, sensors in robots, and robot types based on locomotion. The functional parts like actuators, sensors, chassis, power source, controller were directly shown to children with her autonomous bot kit. A line follower robot was operated, distance and obstacle sensor in it driven children crazy for robotics. In the end, they assembled a humanoid robot and surprised when it moved with its big eyes, and mechanical arms.

Science Screening: 17.11.2018: Short presentations about cyclones were given by




children. They enacted small skits about natural disasters. Videos explaining the recent cyclone Gaja, low atmospheric pressure, and weather facts were screened. News about life loses, habitat loses, and cultivation loses were explained to children. Children get to know about the facts about natural disasters. climate change, environmental aspects. Simple Experiments: 11.01.2019: Urs was assisting Elaa in the science lessons for the younger students. They were working on **maths puzzles** to train basic operations, science experiments - such as making the fire of a candle go out when deprived of oxygen - and also raised awareness of **environmental issues** (especially plastic waste) through role plays.

Discussion went on for 90 minutes with the pictures of Indonesia's volcanoes, salty beaches, traditions, the oldest temples, jungles. Videos about the Green school in Bali, the house built up with bamboo sticks, drama, puppetry were screened in the session and the

architecture brought the unknown facts of Indonesia to our kids. The marvellous stupas in the world's largest Buddhist temple Yogyakarta, the outstanding architecture of 224 smaller shrines in Pramanan in Java, mosques, the depiction of epics through puppetry and plays were unique to know the Hindu-Buddhist-Islamic tradition of Indonesia. The details about each part of Indonesia were not just sprinkled but instilled in the kids with knowledge about the culture, map routes, tradition, religious harmony, and environment aspects.

Heritage Walk: 17.06.2018



Anand, Arun, Prem, Srinath, Vicky and Intern Thurcga went to Varichiyur for a **Jain circuit** visit. It is a village placed in Madurai East Block of Madurai district in Tamil Nadu. Over there, they visited one of the ancient centres of Jainism dating back to 2200 years old. 
History and Geography about Vietnam: 10.07.2018: Madurai Seed encourages children

DAM construction: 25.08.2018: The importance of dam, its working and benefits and



disadvantages were explained with power point presentation for children and young people. The very **essential benefits** of building dams like hydroelectric generation, irrigation, flood control, recreation. The **disadvantages** include deforestation, migration of people was provided in detail with pictures. Videos on how dams are built, the history of oldest dams in India, types of dams, and every parts of dams were discussed in the session. Following that, scavenger hunt on

science facts created for five different groups to develop their sense of searching and finding results. They read questions on big screen, discuss for answers with their group, find and shout the answer aloud taking marks/stars with them.

Also, she educated them in brief about good touch and bad touch, and how can we protect ourselves from abuse. She emphasised on escaping from abuse, reporting abuse, and staying safe. Life skills Training: September to December 2018: Thalir Thiran Thittam (TTT) of Aparajitha Foundation which imparts life skill lessons to children in various schools. Here in Madurai Seed, we organize TTT classes with the books given by them and using audio visual aids, young people provide lessons on self-awareness, communication, decision making, and Interpersonal skills. Positive behavior, good manners, polite talks, kind actions are important

life skill to be acquired which our teacher volunteers Vindhiya & Viji carried out. They role played, and elicited answers, discussed points on developing good manners and being polite to all in public, school, and occasions. Volunteers Kaleeswari and Makkathu Nilavu taught children the life skill lesson on **creative thinking**. They learnt various strategies and ways to implement them in their daily life. It was very interactive and insightful. Madhan and Surya took an important topic emphasizing **etiquette and time management**. Sathish and Vasanth discussed interpersonal and intra personal skills in which children performed short skits on how to communicate and maintain good relationship with elders and peer groups.


from the Food festival organized by Vanmugil Cultural Club of Madurai Seed was spent for sport meet activity at nearby elementary school children hostel.
















Summer is a long vacation for students and summer camp is another way to get away from regular chores and horn life skills.

The objective of Vasantham Summer Camp

- To spend the holidays useful
- To let them feel the togetherness
- To kindle their creative minds
- To enable them search and find their inner potentials
- To develop leadership skills
- To feel free from usual household and school works
- To be in dependent at all their personal works
- To build their self-esteem
- To give them exposure through resource persons
- To keep them active and participating in all activities by trashing their fear and shyness
- To provide them with a positive experience of living and learning independently.
- To yield productive youth with volunteering capabilities
- To encourage peer interactions
- To give them safe and fresh outdoor experiences

Camping place:

The **20**th **Vasantham** Camp was designed for seven days. The first three days was organized in **Vandugal arangam** of Madurai Seed in Karumbalai. The next three days camp was residential in **CESCI**, and the final valedictory day was held in IGSR hall, **Gandhi Museum**.



Life at camp: Camp life is different from usual weekend learning in centers as we take children for residential stay outside Madurai. Usual days in camp make children to see the wonders a day has like early wake up, walking aisle of trees, Shradhana – physical work, exercises, breakfast under bamboo roofs, assembly, warm up activities, input sessions, life

skills learning sessions, continuing learning for the whole day with tea snack, lunch, cultural evening, dinner, songs, and days end in bed time chats before midnight

Schools' curriculum, family's work uploads have to be swiped out from campers' mind to let them get interests and motivated. Every camp being organized to create a spark and bring the best in them. Training on phonemic awareness: September 2018



Rajendran, a Linguist and has years of experiences as an English teacher has trained our young people in teaching English **alphabets** and **phonemes** to children. He is trying to create a module which will help children who can't identify alphabets, sounds and support in their reading skills. Young people got their introductory class, dos and don'ts while teaching the material, and tips. The training will further develop week by week and the follow-ups will be monitored. He took **06 hours** of training to **young people** and **04**

hours of classes to children in the months of September 2018.

Strategies for teaching English: 22.01.2019



This workshop focused on implementing writing skills, checking grammar using concept questions and meanings, and spoken communication and fluency needed for an English classroom. **Keith & Nick**, English teachers from Zurich piloted this one-day workshop for teacher trainee from **Thiagaraja College of Preceptors** and Madurai seed young people. Method of correcting students' test papers using symbols, writing skills lessons to produce exact vocabulary, lessons on checking the understanding

of pupils, **teaching tenses** using timelines were illustrated by Keith Rossborough &Nick. Workshop enabled participants to explore methodologies and competencies in teaching English. Active involvement of students was the highlight of this workshop, where they were provided with online resources, and strategies for teaching English

Workshop on Web Tools for teaching English: 13.02.2019



SMART teacher workshop presented by Prof. **John Potts**; an ELT from Zurich focused on bringing technology into classroom. No teachers come out from classroom with dust of chalk piece on hands once they start using web tools, as it has plenty of resources for teaching English. The participants are teachers, students from various schools, and colleges. They were given hands on experience in utilizing **internet** for students. Guided to log in web tool links, created study sets, clarified doubts while using it, and on the spot,

they started to explore tools like **quizlet**, **EVP**, **google file**, and so on. All resources were reliable, free and some pay for and practicable for teachers to use. The whole day workshop insisted Explore-Learn-Teach using web tools for a smart teacher who updates her/his knowledge to innovate new methodology in classroom.

Madurai Seed has a mixed group of children with slow bloomers more in numbers than others. Our teacher volunteers help in all way to achieve reading, writing and arithmetic ability of every child. Supporting them for making lesson plans, materials, study sets through resource persons ensure quality teaching and learning process. Experiential Teaching workshop was organized for **25 members** from Madurai Seed and Thiagarajar College of Preceptors college under three modules for six days in Kaleidoscope and TCP college. The **six-day module** is all about understanding and experiencing the processes involved in learning.

1st Module: 8th - 9th, December 2018

- Introduction to the training program.
- Understanding child development.
- Role of physical movement in learning.
- Understanding of learning various learning styles and its uses in teaching.
- · Role of memory and attention, it application.

2nd Module: 23rd-24th, February 2019

- Understanding the difference between skill, content and knowledge.
- How to develop reading skills.
- · How to develop writing skills.
- How to develop study skills.

Some of the teaching strategies discussed in the workshop.

- Teaching **Mathematics** in a fun and interesting way for children. Ms. Arthy put forth the solutions to overcome Math difficulties and she emphasized on tricks, shortcuts for doing Math fast.
- Integrating **Multiple Intelligence** in classroom teaching, implementing MI strategies to find out particular strengths of a student, applying MI through skits, rhymes, & story telling for Kinesthetic learners, activities to use MI theory while teaching were introduced to participants by the resource persons.
- The module on **Language skills** and study sets carried out by Ms. Sathya, provided strategies for breaking complex lessons into simpler using different teaching methodologies like fish-bone method, web, pictorial, venn diagram & linear methods.
- The role of memory- short term, active working and long term and attention & its applications were illustrated by her with examples. Participants were displayed with information on VAKT - Visual, Auditory, Tactile and Kinaesthetic which connects all sensory of a child.
- Mrs. Kala, elucidated the **child's development** phases and teacher's role in it & gave a presentation about child's 7 life processes.
- Life curve about the impacts of experiences in early life and its consequences in later adulthood, generalization concept for quick leaning, importance of play and exercises, movements in learning, were presented by Mrs. Shruthi Ms. Arthi presented interactive teaching sets under linking, stimulating and organizing. Participants learned about categorization, organization, classification and connection. Also, she discussed solution for difficulties in learning English.



The whole workshop was a power packed module full of **strategies**, **activities**, **exercises** for teaching children who needs special care for their studies. It was very useful and productive in understanding various learning styles and its uses in teaching. Enormous energy, loads of interesting lessons, fun filled activities

provided the participants a huge confidence in teaching process. Certificates were provided for everyone at the end of the workshop thanking Mr. **Micky**, Dr. **Prakash**, Ms. **Arthi**, Mr. **Muruges-Viji**.

On 20th,23rd,24th, 25th, 27th Children from 5th to 8th grade stay tuned with Andrea since they are fond of listening and speaking to each other. Teaching English through stories fascinates children. Her classes provided a wonderful chance for children to read along

"Sindhbad's Voyages". She guided children to practice reading, and understanding the whole story of Sindhbad. Page by page she encouraged children to read along and discuss. They could find words' meaning, spelling, pronunciation, and paraphrasing through her classroom activities.



Keith and Nick Classes: Keith Rossborough and Nick Bell, English Language Teachers from Zurich presented a class on "How to improve vocabulary". This was a prior warm-up lesson for the next day's workshop on the same topic. Keith and Nick evaluated every teacher volunteer's skills in listening, speaking and writing by interacting with him/her on familiar topics. The teacher volunteers need more vocabulary to improve

speaking & writing skills. Keith and Nick designed a workshop along with volunteers during the 2 hrs class on 19th Jan 2019.



Elavarasi English Classes: She teaches English and science to higher secondary students of Madurai Seed. Three evenings a week she gives English classes for teaching volunteers. Her lesson plans consist of English for interviews, English for classroom, English for competitive examination and spoken English activities and exercises. Oxford University Press books, Raymund Murphy's & online resources like One

Stop English are used in classes for young people. Usage of gadgets, apps and BBC, British council's videos and activities in classes is interesting and encouraging to them. They are evaluated with set of comprehension, and speaking tests regularly.

Arun English Classes: He teaches English classes for children from 5th to 8th grade



children of Vergal Arangam. Most of the activities in classroom are intended to develop their spoken English. Reading and listening to short stories, grammar lessons, and exercises. Worksheets from online resources helps children to learn English language with interest. He used storyweaver.in.org in classes and used read along stories and other stories for reading practice. Also, from July to November 2018, Arun volunteered as English Teacher in Corporation

Boys High School at Sellur. He handled English classes to 6,7,8 classes. He taught English to students who can't read.

Spell Bee Competition: 26.09.2018: Spell Bee competition was conducted for 5 groups in



5 rounds. The groups had a mixture of age group from 6 to 18. Participants were given broad range of vocabulary from **two letter words** to **unfamiliar words**. The difficulty level was increased in each round. They were asked questions from random pages in book, newspaper, magazines, etc. A little time was given to learn, and then the questions were asked for children. Volunteers also eagerly took part in the session. This activity creates interest in

learning English and breaks fear and hesitation among the children. They take part actively spelling words aloud and correct.

young people which they lack in schools and colleges. As Arunkumar has experiences in creating and designing resume, our volunteers got specific ideas, and rules in writing it. With some **resume formats**, he showed them how to write an attractive resume & what employers expect and get impressed from the resume. Guidelines to update resume, suggestions to highlight job skills in the resume, and tips on creating a

resume with good vocabularies & neat presentation were discussed by Arun during the session.

Writing a great resume: 01.07.2018: After finishing studies, the very important part is to



writing know а resume in one's own. Murugesan anna provided a wonderful workshop on writing a great resume. As the impression it makes about interviewer, step by step pattern, essentials to include in reverse chronological order, additional information to be highlighted, the functional and combinational writing style, ordering one's information, font sizes. introductions, what should and should not be

included, etc., were explained through the presentation of Mr. Muruges. He also provided **tips on interview skills**. It was very useful for the young people.

Effective communication for Job Interviews and Presentations Workshop:



On 29.07.2018, To gain confident, to overcome nervousness, to prepare and practice well and to face interview procedures, Madurai Seed trains young people through various resource persons. **Andrea**, an ELT from Switzerland conducted workshop on "Effective communication for Job Interviews and Presentations", in which she discussed important characteristics with key notes in the beginning of session, following that group

discussions on describing about current job, personal qualities, personal weakness, how to overcome a difficult situation, describing ambitions and achievements was done by her eliciting ideas from the participants. She elaborated what makes a **successful interview**, the use of functional language and vocabulary, and at last **role play** by the participants in groups provided abundance of information for interviews. Young people in groups had role play involving one as interviewee, another one as note taker, two as interviewers with set of questions. They experienced this mock interview useful and got feedback and appreciation from Andrea.

Workshop on writing stories and poetry: 13.01.2019



Katrin, an ELT facilitated the workshop with **Urs**, an IT professional from Zurich for Madurai Seed young people. Urs introduced the contents of the workshop and Katrin begun **Story writing** session by reading out a fable explaining what and how a story has to be written. She warmed minds up by showing a picture from Kerala flood, the participants were asked not to write real **story behind the picture**, but words in their own. And in few minutes, four stories for one picture came out

from participant writers. Again, teams got shuffled picture stories, arranged it in order, discussed with peers, framed the beginning, middle and end part of the pictures in sequence, wrote down a story and read it for all. By this way, they understood their **imagination** can be put into words and creativity can be carved in papers.

The part 2 of workshop was interesting, as it gave a very new experience for all. **Haiku poems**, rules and structure to write it, was delivered with examples by Katrin and Arun. Both read poems from Japanese and famous poets of English. It seemed a long thought process went on in the minds of participants as they recalled moments, grabbed vocabulary, wrote poetically, broke it into three-line haiku and finally they articulated it for peers. Everyone turned into a haiku poet in the end.

Workshop on Group Discussion: 10.02.19



The teacher volunteers of Madurai Seed were motivated to participate, and engage in group discussion through the workshop facilitated by Prof. **John Potts**, an ELT from Zurich. As they enter next level after studies for jobs, the workshop was structured to make them communicate in **interviews** and open **discussions**. It was also focused on areas like articulating

one's view, enabling one's thoughts to speak out, developing vocabulary list to discuss, and expressing structured and valuable points.



Useful **fixed expressions**, and content for communication were added to be well versed for GD. John sir began the workshop with **speaking activities** using a board game with quick topics to discuss about oneself which helped them in developing fluency. "What's the connection?" a game in which they had to find relation between the facilitator and the

facts given in a sheet of paper. This activity developed speculating and asking questions. Continuous two warm-up activity let each participant to ask for opinions, agreeing and dis-agreeing, giving comments/opinions in the "paired up" discussion session with A/B topics given.

The teams were provided with different A/B/C/D topics to discuss in group discussion session. Participants practiced standard form of expressions to use in GD and involved in final GD, observed and added points to remember for GD. The workshop strengthened our young people's skills for an effective GD. Little by little, the participants were brought to learn and practice language needed for a GD.

For two days in Tallakulam area, and Anna Nagar area we have provided **water** and **buttermilk** to people. In these two events, nearly 3000 people benefited from that service. We don't do this service as a religious activity, but seeing the occasion as a time for working, sharing, spending time together as a family.

The play dealt with a social message about how caste and religion haunts togetherness and happiness and the importance of young people to protect our society from those demons.

Religious Harmony- Barriers and Solutions:

11.07.18 at IGSR Hall, Gandhi Museum

No. of participants: 86 young people from The American College, Fatima College, Thiagarajar college of Preceptors, St. Justin's college, Sri Meenakshi college and Madurai Seed.





There is love and affection between religions of India, and so ours is called as a **secular country**. Also, there lies some **barriers** to encourage religious **harmony**. The barriers prevail because of the strong religious faith of one's own religion and unwilling to learn other religion concepts oneself.

It is indeed an important **duty of young people** to grow peace and harmony in everything they see. Madurai Seed organized this event for young people to think about the barriers and solutions for religious harmony. In this event, scholars delivered **speeches on Hinduism**, **Islam**, **Christianity**, **and Buddhism**.

Prof. Dr. E. Annamalai from the Chicago University stated the formation of religions only to shape civilization, moral codes and social structure. He highlighted that religion evolves according to the human culture and religions have beliefs in common to attain peace.

Swamiji. Sadha Sivananda, from the "TamilNadu Thuraviyar Peravari" shared his strict beliefs in Hinduism and also questioned the religion conversion practices. Writer Mrs. Dr. Nageshwari from USA, shared her experiences about how she made her views wide by not following organized religion as the sole. Social Activist **Mr. Abdul Rasaq**, talked about Islamic religion, asked the young people to understand thoroughly about one's own religion and next to learn other religious concepts. **Mr. Murugan**, a scholar from the American College expressed his views about Buddhism where Dhamma was practiced and taught. An MSW student from the Fatima college, Ms. Jothi's sharp note about Christianity and the reasons she adheres to it. **Mr. Rabeek Raja** played the role of moderator of this event, his speech stimulated the speakers to think and answer more. He kept the speakers' content relevant to the topic. It was live and organized discussion with the stamina of Rabeek.

Young people from various colleges clarified their religious perspectives right through encountering questions to the scholars. The barriers and solutions were discussed with the young generation.

Celebrating Women:

From 11.10.2018 to 19.10.2018

The nine auspicious days of Navratri festival are dedicated to the Goddesses Kaali, Durga and Saraswathi. The woman rising up now are the real incarnation of those Goddesses. In Madurai Seed, we signify Navratri as the celebration of womanhood. Nine topics on woman empowerment were presented by Seed volunteer girls and guests every evening during the nine days of the festival.

- Elavarasi presented "**Women's Leadership**" a session about women leaders in various fields. How they lead, and inspire their team as a coach, CEO, manager, headmistress, etc., and how to develop leadership potential were discussed.
- Vindhiya, one of the teacher volunteers gave a speech about "Challenges for women in India". She also delivered what should be done to overcome these challenges.
- Viji, our volunteer presented "Indian laws and provisions for women" in which articles, schemes & government acts for women were detailly highlighted.

Madurai: Political awareness through art is a time tested phenomenon. From graffiti art on walls to street plays to mainstream cinema, art as a vehicle for social and political awareness is not uncommon. A government school in Madurai too went the art way to instill awareness among its students.

On Tuesday, students of the Madurai east panchayat union primary school in Y Othakadai witnessed a short political satire enacted by children of Madurai SEED, a voluntary organisation for underprivileged children and young people. 

Grassroot education to equip a child for life

chool is not the only knowledge powerhouse, a sincere student can start learning at every effective locus. Madurai Seed is one such habitat where children from disadvantaged backgrounds are given an opportunity to empower themselves. Started in 1999, this non-profit organisation works at the grassroot level to educate young minds by setting up free education centres. We talk to its president Karthik Bharathi about setting up of the organisation and what it envisions to accomplish in the near future.

As a child, Karthik, a resident of Karumbalai volunteered to help the needy and destitutes. He was a part of the City Corporation's Adult Lit-eracy Programme and was an active member of the National Service Scheme. "With the help of likeminded volunteers, I started the Madurai Seed in 1999. The primary aim of Seed was to uplift the lives of children who grew up in the slums around Karumbalai. Twenty years ago, a majority of the population in the area was uneducated. Even the school-going children were unable to read or write

properly. I felt the necestive education centre," he

says. Soon, Seed became that one stop where kids gathered after school. From reading, writing, speak-ing to life skills, they were taught everything that a normal school does. Students from the near-by localities are enrolled at the beginning of an academic year. A majority of these kids belong to disadvantaged backgrounds. Impressed by the Seed's in-tent and work, Asha For Education, Boston, USA and Friends of Madurai SEED. Zurich. Switzerland are supporting them

On weekdays, regular classes are conducted between 6 pm and 9.15 pm. The different classes at Seed are: Vaandugal Arangam (Classes 1-4); Vergal Arangam (Classes 5-8)

and Kanavugal Arangam (Classes 9-12).

They also organise a free summer camp every year, where guests conduct interactive sessions with the kids. Skill classes are also held during the month of April and May. They have a library that

houses around 5,000 books.

Madurai Seed releases a yearly magazine, PudhuYugam, and they also focus on imparting the habit of saving money by creating internal saving

accounts called the Thenkoodu. "Seed has a legacy of producing students, who are highly qualified and are doing well in society. At present, most of the volunteers who are taking care of Seed are its former students," he says. Vizhudhugal is their alumni association that is also involved in supporting the organisation.

V. Elavarasi opens the doors to the first floor of Madurai Seed's office in Karumbalai in Madurai and is greeted with a friendly hello anni' (hello sister in-law) from all volunteers. The president and Managing Trustee of an organisation aiming to provide quality supplementary education to girls and boys of Karumbalai, Ms. Elavarasi tells Sanjana Ganesh in an interaction that she is family to almost every adolescent and child in the area.

Ms. Elavarasi completed her undergraduate degree in Physics in 2007 - the same year her father passed away. "I am from Tiruvannamalai and I planned to study further. However, my father's death forced me to work. After that, my marriage was fixed in 2009, " she says. Madurai Seed's founder and Elavarasi's husband B. Karthik would passionately talk about the children in Karumbalai and their extraordinary potential for hours before their marriage, she recalls.

Once she moved to Madurai, she plunged into service and began teaching students. While she pursued her masters in Dhysics

completed a teacher training course, Ms. Elavarasi would teach science and English to the students of Karumbalai. "Very few girls were part of Madurai Seed then. Even today it is common to see girls washing dishes, cleaning house, watching TV and scrolling the phone at the age of 16 and 18. It has been a struggle to convince the girls and their mothers to begin sending them back to school and the after-school centre. After extensive counselling and assurance, things are finally looking up," she says.

Seed provides special education for students post school hours. The Managing Trustee has inculcated the habit of extensively reading on the weekends. She also

and understand science experiments during their weekend at the Galileo Science Club, a wing of Madurai Seed. She conducts personality development initiatives and invites speakers from across the world to help students understand English better and help them with interviews.

Ms. Elavarasi says the extra-curricular activities have helped in instilling confidence and even created a safe space for children. Many come to the office every day to study as the environment is conducive for learning. They are given the space to discuss issues of importance to adolescent health. including sex education.

Six of the 10 students from the total 250 are girls but Ms. Elavarasi wants the number to rise. "Today, there are girls from Madurai Seed who are engineers, doctors, nurses and professors. This is only because the organisation is constantly encouraged to increase the number of women and empower them," she says. She hopes to have an egalitarian society where men and women have equal access to opportunities and

ome Tuesday, we will all be dressed in our best attires and forget diet for that one day as it is Diwali. Some of the NGOs in the city are also gear-ing up to lighten up the day for the underprivileged and the disadvantaged. They tell City Express how they plan to celebrate the festival.

Started by S Mal-aisamy and M Kishore Kumar in 2012, NGO Padikkattugal has volunteers across the state. In 2012, they started visit ing orphanages and old age homes to identify the problems faced by residents there.

Introduction

Before going into the thick of the subject, I will specify that because of a visa problem, I did a one-month internship in India, then a second internship in a law firm in Paris.

Following a one-year exchange at the University of Geneva in Switzerland and a Master's degree in International Law from Paris-Nanterre University, I decided to do a Master II degree in Law, Political Science and international relations within the University of Clermont Auvergne.

During my studies, I had the opportunity not only to do internships in law firms, but I also had the opportunity to participate in various volunteer missions with UNICEF. My year spent in Geneva, as well as the different volunteering experiences have increased my desire to work in an international context and have especially strengthened my desire to work in the field of human rights.

In order to obtain the Master II, we have to do a professional internship related to our studies. Having never done internships in NGOs, my choice was quite fast. I wanted to have an experience in an NGO, to make more concrete my career orientation and confirm my desire to specialize in human rights.

So I wanted to focus on a specific geographical area: AsiaI have a very special interest for Asia, since I come from this continent. Indeed, of Sri Lankan Tamil origin, but born in the Philippines, I acquired and deepened for a long time my knowledge on this region.n addition, I decided to target only NGOs fighting for the protection of children's rights in Asia. In fact, millions of children in Asia have their rights violated, including the deprivation of social, educational and cultural rights. They are denied access to school, health care and social benefits, are inappropriately separated from their families and affected by exploitation, abuse and violence in their homes and communities. Everywhere, groups of children are left behind, victims of prejudice and discrimination. Among the most vulnerable are children born in poverty, children from ethnic minorities or children with disabilities.

After careful study of the missions of each NGO fighting for the protection of children's rights, I sent many applications to every corner of Asia, particularly in India, Malaysia, or the Philippines.

Of all the applications sent, an NGO named MADURAI SEED, located in Madurai, Tamil Nadu State, was the first to give me a positive response. It is a local NGO that focuses mainly on educating children and young people from a disadvantaged environment. We will come back to this in more detail about the roles and missions of this organization.

One of the main reasons for my application to MADURAI SEED was of course its field of action: education. In addition, the idea of working closely and interacting with other local organizations but also with young people, proved to be a great opportunity for me to have real field experience. Finally, the language spoken in Madurai is Tamil, language that I speak perfectly.

As I mentioned above, because of a visa problem, my internship was shortened to 1 month, so I had to look for another internship in France. I decided to direct my research to law firms. An internship in an NGO then at a law firm can be seen as contradictory.

However my previous experience was not in the field of Human rights, so I wanted to move towards a small law firm exercising in Human rights and anti-terrorism as the cabinet Axel METZKER, to familiarize myself with this type of structure and discover the many facets of the profession of lawyer practicing in the field of Human rights and to a lesser extent, contribute to the life of the firm. I will present in the first part my internship done in India.

Inequalities in the education system in India

India is the world's largest democracy and, according to UN estimates, its population is expected to surpass China's in 2028 to become the world's most populous nation.

As a growing economic power and a nuclear-weapon State, India has become an important regional power. But it also tackles enormous social, economic and environmental problems. For example, education is a major challenge in India especially for children and students from poor families. Everyone's right to education is one of the Human rights. This right has been enshrined in several fundamental texts such as Article 26 of the 1948 Universal Declaration of Human Rights:

«Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages. Elementary education shall be compulsory. Technical and professional education shall be made generally available and higher education shall be equally accessible to all on the basis of merit.

Education shall be directed to the full development of the human personality and to the strengthening of respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms. It shall promote understanding, tolerance and friendship among all nations, racial or religious groups, and shall further the activities of the United Nations for the maintenance of peace.

Parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children »

But this right is found in other texts such as in: International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights 1966 (Articles 2, 13 and 141), in the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination (articles 1, 2 and 52), Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (Articles 1 and 10 3), the Convention on the Rights of the Child (articles 2, 9, 28 and 29 4), the European Convention on Human Rights (Article 2 of the First Additional Protocol), Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (Article 24).

In addition, lack of education is a fundamental problem in India and the situation of Indian public schools is a clear illustration of this. Education is a constitutional right in India, but its provision is far below an adequate standard. Yet the Indian government is well aware of the problems of the Indian education system, but has been slow to respond. For example, the school infrastructure is in poor condition and many teachers are not properly qualified, with a quarter of them having no degree. Schools are also without electricity. Half of the country does not even have access to adequate education and only a small part can go to private university because of a considerable lack of good quality education for the poor or because the limited places in private universities, resulting in a very intense competition between students; most go to public universities, which are mostly free and offer little benefit.

There are also sociological factors, including the caste system, which is a serious problem, and the extreme pressure exerted by parents or society on the use of education for financial security. There is very little incentive to take risks and follow your own interests or encourage creativity.

These circumstances create a difficult situation for socio-economically disadvantaged groups who cannot afford a private school to educate their child. These failures of the Indian education system push people to work in low-paid and unsafe jobs, which in most cases do not correspond to their level of education and where they are exploited and imprisoned in a state of deprivation. A vicious circle is created between generations.

States have an obligation to provide education to their citizens and, unfortunately, in India this obligation is not fulfilled. The field of education is therefore intrinsically complex in India. However, better than ministries or even private schools, NGOs can adopt new methodologies and experiment easily in the field. A large number of NGOs offer brilliant projects and sometimes develop them if they are successfully piloted.

Madurai SEED, NGO focused on the welfare and education of children and young people of Karumbalai intervenes in this context.

Presentation of the founder of MADURAI SEED

A.S Karthikbharati is the 6th child of a poor family whose parents have not attended school. In his words, poverty has haunted him during school days. He held several part- time jobs to finance his high school and university studies. Karumbalai, this poor slum of Madurai lacked economic well-being, opportunities and advice. From his childhood he joined many social service forums. Indeed, he wanted to do something to the children of his region so that they could know the benefits of education. So he created a space for children where they could come to read books, and then this space was extended to evening centers where teaching volunteers shared with the youngest the virtues of education.

From 1990 to 1999, he participated in many projects where he served for people living not only in Karumbalai, but also around Madurai. He then created SEED and worked in disadvantaged areas such as Karumbalai, Sambakudi and Thatthaneri until 2006. It was in 2007 that A. Karthikbarathi reinstated MADURAI SEED as a non-profit organization under the Indian Trust Act of 2007. What is important to mention is that A.S.Karthik Bharathi grew up and lived in Karumbalai and therefore knows the situation and the problems that the children and young people of Karumbalai are facing.

Despite the difficulties, he obtained a master's degree in Tamil literature and received a state and university award for the best volunteer of the national service program. He is a member of the ASHA for Education (Boston, USA) from 2003. Over the last 13 years, he has managed to make MADURAI SEED a very popular and successful organization

Presentation of MADURAI SEED

MADURAI SEED is a non-profit organization founded in 1999, whose objective is to promote the education of disadvantaged children and young people. "Seed" refers to their belief that every child has great potential, when underprivileged children and youth are supported by adequate resources and opportunities, just like a plant, they can grow and reach great heights.

The team consists first of President Karthick Barathi and his wife Elavarasi Karthik director of Madurai SEED. Then there is the financial administrator and secretary, Mr. Mansurali and Mr.Muthupandi who also grew up in Karumbalai. As my tutor of internship, they know the situation there. Mansurali holds degrees in Computer Science and Sociology and Muthupandi in Accounting. These are important elements of the team because they are in charge of budget management and manage the bureaucratic aspects of the organization.

Then comes Ms. V.Mammammal who is a director and board member who has worked as a English & Social Sciences teacher in a high school. She was very knowledgeable about the social and economic environment of the children of Karumbalai. Today she is a retired teacher and gives English lessons to the older ones.

Arun Kumar, the coordinator studied English literature. It is one of the reasons for the fulfillment of MADURAI SEED in the administration.

Then the organization relies heavily on the many student volunteers, who help the development of children including giving complementary classes in the evening from 6 to 8pm.

Finally there are many advisers and volunteers who help in the financing of Madurai SEED. Sponsors such as Asha Boston, or sponsor teams in Switzerland are very used in the financing of educational projects, school materials, etc. However, among the volunteers there are many friends, colleagues and other local organizations involved in supporting and helping children to achieve their dreams.

The role and missions of Madurai Seed

Karumbalai is a region of Madurai, a slum located behind the city centre of Madurai. For a very long time, the term "slum" has been associated with a dirty habitat and occupied by a miserable and criminal population. In French, the word "slum" was used for the first time about Morocco to literally refer to "houses in cans", a set of houses built with recycled materials.

Today, there are certain characteristics to take into account to qualify a slum, especially overcrowding, poor quality housing located in most cases on the outskirts of city centers. There is also a lack of access to drinking water etc.

This is the case of Karumbalai, where many children and young students live.

India, as a nation, has taken measures in relation to education by adopting measures such as free compulsory education for every child up to the age of 14, and so on. However, the real problem may not be the issue of access to education, but rather the quality of the education provided and the lack of employment opportunities at the end of the course.

In India, there are 3 types of schools: state-owned schools and private schools but also government aided schools. Private schools deemed expensive and offering quality education can not be paid by parents for lack of income. Children and students have to be content with public schools and universities that are of little benefit to them.

The main mission of Madurai Seed is "To Provide a Supportive, Nurturing Environment for Socially, Economically Disadvantaged Children and Young People to Discover and Develop Their Mental Abilities; Enrich Their Sense of Self-Esteem, and Empower Them with Emotional Stability to Promote Personal and Social Responsibilities."

In general, children attending the centers come from disadvantaged areas of the city. For the majority of the children and students I spoke to, their fathers work as farmers, house painter or auto driver, and their mothers also earn a bit as housekeepers in most cases, to satisfy their basic needs. Illiteracy and alcohol dependence of parents can lead to poor and stagnant child development. And the goal of Madurai Seed is precisely to prevent this and offer them a peaceful and joyful learning environment.

Children in urban slums therefore receive very little support from their families and the government. As they go to public schools nearby, their exposure to the outside world is impossible. They live in small houses without facilities to study and have no space to have fun with their friends.

As a result, Madurai Seed has created small centers for children and students. They ensure that each child discovers their needs, stimulates their potential and motivates them to strive for success and to support them morally and financially. Depending on their age, Madurai Seed operates in four centers to give them additional education in the evening.

Students attending university become volunteers and teach children in return for a monthly stipend. Special events such as library days, savings system, exhibition visits, scholarships, endowments, skills and personality development programs and other extracurricular activities are there to enrich their leadership skills, their creativity, their aspiration and their communication.

The importance of Madurai Seed for the young people of Karumbalai

I had the opportunity to interview three young students from Karumbalai who gave me their point of view on Madurai SEED and in particular the importance of this organization.

Living in Karumbalai since birth, Srinath, a 3rd year English student, joined Madurai SEED because of personal problems. He was 7 years old when he joined the NGO. Today he is now a volunteer and teaches Tamil to the younger ones.

According to him, without Madurai Seed he would not have become what he is today. This NGO has strengthened its skills as teamwork, solidarity, autonomy but also communication, skills that do not develop enough in school according to him. He also says he has learned and enriched his knowledge in many areas during cultural sessions. Finally, A. Karthikbarathi whom he calls "anna" (brother), is a leader for him and for all young people.

Another student, Prem who is currently in 3rd year of tourism studies, and also living in Karumbalai, joined Madurai SEED 4 years ago because he wanted to enroll in tutoring to pass his high school degree (final exam in 12). He thinks it was thanks to this tutoring, to the advice and encouragement of the team, that he was able to have very good grades.

Moreover, according to him, the NGO pushes young people enormously to do what they want to do.

Prem, for example, has a particular interest in dance. When the NGO prepares projects of activities like dance, it is to him that one calls upon to prepare a choreography.

However, there is little opportunity in universities to practice activities. He said that without Madurai Seed, he would stay with boys his age on the street doing nothing. Today, he thinks he is responsible, autonomous and has grown up in maturity. Prem who did not speak English, today communicates more easily in this language thanks to the teachings given by Madurai SEED. Indeed, in public universities, English is not taught properly or not at all, it requires for that go to private universities.

Finally I met Vindya, a young student in the 2nd year of English. Since the age of 8 she is in Madurai Seed. According to her, being at SEED is a way to open up and learn new skills, to find each other's talents and to showcase them. Since she is in Madurai Seed she has confidence in her and manages to speak without any sign of stress in front of a crowd. What she likes is the different cultural outings that can awaken the intellectual curiosity.

In addition, she shares with me one important thing about girls' education. In her own words she said to me the following: "If I had not been to Madurai Seed, I would probably have stopped the classes or I would have continued but returning in the evening, instead of studying, I would have cooked, cleaned and ironed."

Indeed, education is a basic human right that should be fully exercised in all countries, but for many girls in India, attending school is not an option. One of the main reasons for the lack of girls education in India is that India remains a patriarchal society, a male dominated society. Although the country is progressing, the belief that women belong to the home is still widespread. Poverty, is an important factor, but it is not the only thing that disrupts the fundamental right to education.

There is a common belief in rural villages that girls must stop attending school after puberty, as they are most often teased by boys for the duration of their walk from home to school. India has the largest number of married children in Asia, and there is inevitably this dogma that surrounds girls: educating them is a waste of time and money because they are born only to be married and to manage the house.

The 3 students eventually concluded that changes should be made in public schools, especially on the quality of teaching. They add that there is a lot of favoritism within the classrooms. In addition, they told me that studying in a public school is not as valuable as studying in a private school, the opportunities are not the same in the end.

Conference given on the French education system

A local organization partner to Madurai SEED offered me to give a conference on the French education system to teachers, students, writers and even journalists. The challenge was to present the organization of our system from kindergarten to higher education so that the public can then compare with their educational system.

For 45 minutes I explained in Tamil how our educational system worked. Then for 1 hour, questions were asked by students interested in studying in Europe. In most universities in Madurai, there is no school exchange system, which is a big mistake I think.

Moreover, I exchanged a lot about this distinction between private and public schools. Indeed, as I have already mentioned above, in India there are different types of schools: state-owned schools and private schools. Public schools do indeed a commendable job in making education accessible to a larger number of people and normally do so for free. They are a great help to people in urban and rural areas for whom it is impossible to bring their children to the most expensive private schools. However, some problems persist.

Public schools are not deemed to offer students the educational and hospitality standards that are available to them. One of the main consequences of this phenomenon is perhaps the scarcity of jobs for young school children in India, especially in rural areas. After all, why would one want to be an engineering student and then stay at home without a job? Because yes, many students who have studied in public universities do not find a job. They must be content with lower-level jobs even after having been educated, and having a bachelor or master degree.

I take for example the case of a girl that I met, she is passionate about design and fashion. However, there is no sector in this area in Madurai. For lack of a means, she simply studied engineering at a public university and whose registration fees are free, although she knows that her diploma will have no value because she will not find any employment in this field.

So, I asked why study engineering if ultimately a job in this area is almost impossible to find. I have been told that one the fees are free and two having a degree in engineering is well seen by the society. When I asked her what she was going to do after graduation, she said that she would find a teaching position at a public elementary school, a more accessible job for people who had studied at public universities. She also told me that being a teacher in a public school is not the same as being a teacher in a private school, the salary being better.

Education in such a situation becomes a way to waste time and this is a worrying aspect. For this reason, even low-income families try to send by all means even the worst, their children in a private institute for a better future. This distinction between public and private schools is then a point of comparison with France. There are private and public schools in France, but everyone can claim a quality education in each of its schools and have a good job at the end without distinction.

Also, some were particularly shocked about the many help given to us by the French state to finance our studies and for our needs. Indeed, in France, Student with scholarship can be exempted from tuition fees, and receive an allowance every month. In addition, some students also receive housing allowances. In India, on the other hand, parents are ruining themselves to pay for children's higher education.

The education of Sri Lankan refugees in Tamil Nadu

In the past decade, more than two million children have been killed in conflict, and another six million have been injured and more than one million orphans can be found.

Sri Lanka is one of the regions in the world where human ethnic conflict has persisted for decades. Many Tamil refugees from Sri Lanka have taken refuge in the state of Tamil Nadu in southern India. These refugees have been rehabilitated in camps on the east coast of Tamil Nadu for more than two decades. Madurai Seed's team prepared a cultural trip to a Sri Lankan refugee camp. We went to one of the Sri Lankan refugee camps in Madurai to learn more about the living conditions of children and students, including their situation regard to studies.

With Camera and notepad, my mission was to go through the whole camp to ask the parents about their living conditions and especially in relation to studies. I had therefore prepared a lot of questions in order to question the inhabitants of this camp. As a Sri Lankan of Tamil origin, I had to see for myself the conditions in which my compatriots lived.

Whatever the reasons for these forced movements and migrations, new challenges are faced in these camps, including how individuals (children and adults), families and communities can exercise their human rights, including the right to protection, education and dignity.

Women, men, boys and girls of all ages, refugees, asylum-seekers, stateless persons, returnees or internally displaced persons have the right to education.

However, it should be noted that refugee children are five times more likely than their national peers to be out of school. The lack of educational opportunities for refugees fuels ongoing migration, xenophobia and despair.

A good education is therefore fundamental to enable a promising future for refugees. There is also ample evidence that migrant, refugee and asylum seeker students in many countries are at a much higher risk of marginalization in educational systems and opportunities compared to native students.

For example, because of their unclear legal status and lack of uniform documentation, Sri Lankan Tamil refugees have limited access to essential services and almost no means of subsistence.

While some refugees have been able to generate income by working in the private sector, many of them, particularly vulnerable women and even men, are forced to rely on income from small jobs as an unsustainable livelihood option that often exposes them to exploitation.

Because yes, although not officially allowed to work in India, refugees work in the informal sector to supplement their incomes: in most cases, they are often students with a Bachelor or a Master Degree.

From what I have seen and heard; Tamil refugees are increasingly seeking to go abroad for livelihood opportunities. Indeed, if you are a refugee you can only apply for a job if it is in private sectors like for example, housekeeper or mason. There is this label stuck on their forehead and it deprive them of a good job despite a diploma in their pocket.

A writer by the name of Pathinathan, a Sri Lankan Tamil who had accompanied us, told in an interview, than companies are reluctant to employ qualified people from the Sri Lankan refugee community. That is why many decide to go abroad.

I met a young Sri Lankan refugee couple, one of whom graduated from an engineering school and the other from a master's degree in mathematics. The wife is a housewife mom and gives tutoring classes in the camp, while the husband is a house painter in the private sector.

As much as an Indian person coming from a poor family, and with a Bachelor or Master degree can find somehow a job even if it is not the good field, a refugee student is sure not to find some because of his legal status, which is totally different from refugees in France who study and find the same job as a French citizen, and can also apply to be naturalized.

On the other hand, refugee status within the meaning of the Geneva Convention does not exist in India. If no law is passed on the status of refugees in India, the future of the next generations, especially with regard to education and employment, is compromised.

Conclusion:

In India, the choice to live outside the failing grid of government services is usually reserved for the rich or the middle class, who can afford private housing, private hospitals and private schools. However, an increasing number of poor parents in India are now raising funds to send their children to low-cost private schools in hopes of helping them escape poverty.

Education in India is a system that therefore requires considerable improvement especially for people from poor families and this must come from a change in policy. For example, it is necessary to make private schools more accessible by taking into account the resources of poor families, or to improve public universities, in particular by improving the quality of education.

In this sense, Madurai Seed's commitment to strengthening and supporting disadvantaged children is visible. Madurai SEED has changed the lives of many children and youth in Karumbalai, coming from a slum, going to school, continuing to study at school, going to university, having a job through to education is a big change to them.

Many parents in Karumbalai began to think that education was a step in getting out of poverty. Even if people end up with low-paying and insecure jobs, which in most cases do not correspond to their level of education, some children in Madurai today despite the difficulties have been able to leave the slum thanks to the education, have found a job with a correct salary and today are sponsors and financially support Madurai Seed. Beyond this, Madurai Seed hopes in the future to expand her territory and build larger buildings to welcome children in better conditions.

It was an incredible experience even it was short; I would like to thank them again for their kindness, their generosity, their smile and their good mood. THANK YOU





Site visit by Melli Annamalai, Asha Boston, July 9-10, 2018

On this visit I spent time with some of the youth volunteers who are eager to do social work. Arun a product of the Seed centres was working in Bangalore and has come to Madurai to take up some projects with Seed. Karthi's wife Elavarasi has blossomed into an excellent social worker. The three of them form such a good team. Arun posted on Facebook that they are available to teach at local government schools, and four schools responded taking them up on their offer!

Arun has embarked on this work and believes the he can work with students who have fallen behind in the government schools and help them learn better.

Then there are Vicky and Anand, such excellent photographers. I wish I could give all them fellowships and have a whole team of youth in Madurai working for social change. Alas, Asha's resources are limited.

This time I went with a concrete plan of discussing a topic, and I chose Vietnam, a place I had visited recently. We had a lively discussion around Vietnam, and how in eleven short years after sending the US troops back home Vietnam had pivoted to capitalism. The entire war was for nothing. I also talked about the connection, far back in time, between India and Vietnam.

We also held an event at the Thedalgal center for young people, built in collaboration with Kaliedoscope. Asha's support includes a small stipend for maintaining the place. It has been built on the terrace of a house, and is such a pleasant place to be. Even in hot Madurai, this space was pleasant. All kudos to Kaliedoscope founder Prof. Prabhakar. The space is used for book readings, art events, and so on. Again, I appreciated that Seed had been creating these relationships with other non-profits in Madurai.





Report from Andrea Wilson, English Tutor, Switzerland

In the summer of 2018, I visited Madurai Seed as a volunteer. It was my second visit, and returning after 2 years, I was keen to see old faces again and hear the stories of the students` progress. I was not disappointed.

I was very warmly welcomed and spent much of my two weeks in English evening classes with a group of mixed level students. We read and did various activities and games around a story and our lessons were

fascinating and great fun. For me this was a first teaching non-adults, and I was met each evening by eager faces, students who seemed to enjoy and value learning, and who had a wonderful sense of fun. It was a great pleasure over these two weeks to see so many young people engaged and absorbed by the classes and activities on offer at the evening school, and especially to see so many young girls actively involved in education and building their futures and future choices.

During my stay, Madurai Seed were to perform and film a drama they had written themselves during one of their camps. Two days after I arrived, the whole school travelled out to a hill outside the city to rehearse and film the production in preparation for the performances at various schools and hostels over several dates.. I saw here what I saw on numerous other occasions with the organisation; a very joyful group of volunteers and students of all ages and sizes working together as a team; the home-grown actors, directors, cameramen, make-up artists here, there the costume makers, bringers of breakfast, prompters, carers, translators (for my benefit) all pulling together to make their unique film. For me this was a very apt picture of what Madurai Seed achieves in its work in Karumbalai.

There are many things I admire about Madurai Seed: the fact that it is truly a grass roots organisation; that the team care so passionately about the education of children, who are the future; that there is a significant place for joy and creativity in education; that learning is not just a matter of maths, physics, languages and bookish study, but also a place for learning life skills such as saving money, co-operation, mutual respect, acceptance of others and self-esteem; that these endeavours really do change the course of people's lives.

I am firmly convinced that the experiences children make with Madurai Seed are character building and powerfully enduring. However, one of the most inspiring things for me is the dedication that Madurai Seed seems to inspire in a number of people who pass through its doors, with each generation of students producing a team of future volunteers, mentors and role models, and so many happy memories. Long may they continue.



Our days with Madurai Seed Family written by Katrin & Urs, Switzerland

It was our first visit to India and since we did not know what to expect we were overwhelmed by the hearty and warm welcome of Karthik, Elaa and Arun at Madurai airport. After a first night's rest at the hotel, we went to the "headquarters" and heart of Madurai Seed – Karumbalai - and already gained some insight

into its magic when we were welcomed by very curious, lively and excited children and highly motivated volunteers, who clearly have found a second home through this project.

In the first week the plan was to get to know Madurai in the mornings and to teach some lessons at Madurai Seed in the evenings. Elaa and Arun very kindly introduced us to the realm of Hindu religion in the impressive Meenakshe Temple, to India's struggle of independence in the Ghandi museum and we thereby learned a lot about Indian culture and its people.

In the evenings, Katrin, as a trained English teacher, together with Arun, started working with the volunteers to improve their English. In their lessons, they focused on short stories, related vocabulary and pronunciation. The eager and highly motivated volunteers made these lessons a pleasure and success.

Having only very little experience in teaching, Urs was assisting Elaa in the science lessons for the younger students of MS. They were working on maths puzzles to train basic operations, science experiments - such as making the fire of a candle go out when deprived of oxygen - and also raised awareness of environmental issues (especially plastic waste) through role plays.

On the last day of this week, we organised a small workshop for the volunteers, which focused on story-writing and Haikus. They were writing their first poems about a particular moment that they remembered well, and the resulting haikus were impressive, capturing vividly intimate moments in their lives. However, educating those young people with more holistic approaches (in contrast to the rather frontal methods that they experience at the public schools) is by no means the only achievement of Madurai Seed. This project goes way beyond the provision of education to young and underprivileged students.

This became particularly clear during the second week of our visit, which was fully dedicated to Pongal, a four-day harvest festival. Instead of letting MS activities rest, Karthik, Arun and Elaa organised an excursion to a farmer's field outside of Madurai, to thank and honour the farmers' hardship and work. To witness these colourful ceremonies and the children's excitement and joy about spending a day outside of Karumbalai is something we will certainly never forget and keep in our hearts.

Yet, not only does Madurai Seed take these young people of Karumbalai outside of their everyday environment to see something different in the world, but they also put much effort into nurturing and unearthing the creativity and talents slumbering in these youngsters. We were able to enjoy the fruits of these endeavours during the evening of National Youth's Day, when the children and volunteers performed in plays, traditional dances, and other acts in the streets of Karambulai. The performances did not have a mere entertaining aspect, though. Social and political topics where very present, as for example in the stunning production depicting the struggle of Indian society with caste, religion and language. It was also nice to see that this event was not only from and for Madurai Seed members but attracted the attention of the whole quarter.

All in all, we were very much impressed and touched by the effort that Karthik, Elaa, Arun and the other trustees put into Madurai Seed. The same holds for the volunteers without whom the project in this form would not work. Although Madurai Seed is a comparatively small project, we were able to witness how great an impact such passionate devotion can achieve. While the "Seed" in Madurai Seed refers to initial support that wants to be given to the children in this project, we consider the project a plant which has to be taken care of and is, without doubt, worth supporting and we hope to see its roots becoming even stronger.





Report from Keith Rossburough, English Professor, Switzerland

I returned to Madurai Seed (MS) in Karumbalai with a colleague Nick Bell in January 2019. Our time was mostly spent with Madurai Seed's young people. We also gave a teacher-training workshop to a group of young teachers in training at Thedagal Resource Centre.

The input sessions with the young people consisted of various activities including, vocabulary acquisition, reading comprehension, and job interview skills. For instance, the young people were encouraged to bring their own newspaper articles to class with which various tasks were carried out. As usual, the young people were very proactive, motivated, and participated in the various tasks with enthusiasm, while collectively achieving the desired task outcomes.

During the one-day trainee-teacher workshop, which was also attended by some of MS's young people, we introduced Concept Questions and Time Lines (Workman 2008). This input was enthusiastically received by the participants who repeatedly commented on how useful these activities were to teach aspect of time, using concept questions to check student understanding. We also used this input at MS with the young people a second time, as they wanted to learn more about incorporating these kinds of activities into their teaching.

What really struck me about this visit was seeing how far the young people have developed professionally, as some of whom are now working is exciting fields including graphic design and teaching. This is extremely motivating for me to see and just confirms the wonderful work being done at Madurai Seed. We were sent off with a theater production depicting the three aspects that divide Indian society: language, caste and religion. A powerful performance given by the children of MS, this reassured me that given the opportunity, it's possible to will-out talent, as was displayed by the young children.







Report from Nick Bell, English Teacher, Switzerland

I want to say what struck me about Madurai Seed during the short visit Keith and I made in January 2019. I studied education in England and it was so refreshing to see ideas that had inspired me then implemented with so much heart and intelligence. I would say that the Madurai Seed model deserves to be used throughout the world, with the provison that the work has to come from the grass roots (rather than imposed from above) and be implemented

with love. This is the case at Madurai Seed, due to the warmth, energy and dedication shown by Karthik, Ela, Arun and the other key players, the wonderful young people and the kids themselves.

What particularly impressed me was the progressive orientation of the curriculum, with plenty of scope for individual creativity and expression. The Madurai Seed emphasis is truly on education in the best sense of bringing out each individual's talents. A good example of this was the performance in the street in front of the Madurai Seed office on our last evening, showing the enemies of society being defeated by the people.

I was apprehensive before visiting India for the first time, but the way Keith and I were welcomed, looked after throughout our visit, and celebrated on the last evening was extraordinary: we were made to feel at home in so many ways. The classes and workshop we gave were challenging but enjoyable and our students were always attentive and fully engaged. After this outstanding experience I intend to return to Karambalai, bringing my wife Maggi with me next time.

முதல் இருநாட்கள் புதிய இடம், புதிய மனிதர்கள் என அவர்களோடு இணைவதில் சற்று தயக்கங்கள் இருந்தாலும் அவர்கள் அனைவரும் என்னோடு பழகிய விதமும், உபசரித்த விதமும் என்னை அவர்களிலிருந்து பிரித்துப்பார்க்க இயலவில்லை, நாழிகைகள் நகர நகர அது என்னுடைய நிகழ்வு என்ற மனநிலை என்னை தொற்றிக் கொண்டது. கிட்டத்தட்ட ஆறு நாட்கள் அவர்களுடனேயே சேர்ந்து தங்கி அவர்களின் பயணத்தின் ஒரு சிறு துரும்பாக இருந்ததன் விளைவாக என்னால் பல விடயங்களில் நல்லதொரு அனுபவத்தினை பெறக்கூடியதாக இருந்தது.

எடுத்து குழந்தைகள் திருவிழா நடத்துவதன் பொறுப்புக்களையும், அதன் அவர்கள் செவ்வனே கையாண்ட (முறையினையும் என்னால் சிரமங்களையும், அவந்நை கண்ணூடாக பார்க்கக் கூடியதாக இருந்தது. மதுரை சீடு குழந்தைகளையும், இளைஞர்களையும் திருவிழாவினை அவர்கள் பல்வேரு வைத்துக் கொண்டு ஐந்து நாள் குழந்தைகள் கோணங்களில் ஒவ்வொரு ഖകെധിல് நாட்களும் ஒன்றோடு ஒன்று தொடர்புபடாத வடிவமைத்திருந்தார்கள்.

ஒவ்வொரு நாட்களும் மாலை 4.30 மணிக்கு ஆரம்பமாகும் குழந்தைகள் திருவிழா இரவு 7.30 மணிவரை நடைபெற்றது. சில இடங்களில் குழந்தைகள் திருவிழா என்பார்கள் அங்கு குழந்தைகள் பார்வையாளர்களாக மட்டுமே இருப்பார்கள். ஆனால் இங்கு குழந்தைகள் பார்வையாளர்களாக மட்டுமல்லாமல் ஆற்றகையாளர்களாகவும், செயற்பாட்டாளர்களாகவும் சில நேரங்களில் ஆசிரியர்களாகவும் கூட செயற்பட்டார்கள். குழந்தைகளிடம் இருந்து கற்றுக் கொள்வதற்கு நிறைய விடயங்கள் இருக்கு என்ற உண்மையினை மதுரை சீடு குழந்தைகள் மூலம் நான் அடிக்கடி உணர்ந்து கொள்ளக்கூடியதாக இருந்தது.

நேரமுகாமைத்துவம், ஒருவருக்கு ஒருவர் விட்டுக் கொடுத்தல், உதவிசெய்தல், சுறுசுறுப்பு, நல்ல விடயங்களை மற்றவருக்கு சொல்லிக் கொடுத்தல், வெளிப்படையான பேச்சு என இன்னும் பல விடயங்களை சொல்லிக் கொண்டே செல்லலாம் ஆரம்பத்தில் மதுரை சீடு என்பது ஆதரவற்ற குழந்தைகள் பராமரிப்பு அமைப்பென எண்ணிய போது அங்கு சென்றதன் பிற்பாடுதான் அது ஒரு அறிவோடு கூடிய ஆக்கத்திறன் செயற்பாட்டு மையம் என விளங்கியது. அமைப்பை சுற்றியுள்ள பிரதேசங்களில் வாழ்கின்ற பாடசாலை மற்றும் கல்லூரியில் கல்வி பயில்கின்ற மாணவர்களை கல்லூரி மற்றும் பாடசாலை முடிந்ததன் பிற்பாடு மாலை முதல் தினசரி அவர்களது வீட்டுப்பாடங்களைக்கவனித்தல், இரவுவரை பாடங்களைச்சொல்லிக்கொடுத்தல், ஆக்கத்திறன் இணை பாடவிதானங்களில் சார்ந்த ஈடுபடவைத்தல் என அவர்களை நாளைய பொறுப்புமிக்க சமூகமாக நல்வழிப்படுத்துகின்ற நற்பணிமையம் என என்னால் புரிந்து கொள்ளமுடிந்தது.

இதில் அங்கு கல்வி கற்று நன்நிலை அடைந்த மாணவர்கள் அங்கேயே தொண்டராசிரியர்களாக இருப்பது சிறப்பிற்குரிய விடயமாகும். மாணவர்களுக்கென நூலகம், தரங்களுக்கு ஏற்ப வகுப்பறைகள் என அவர்களுக்கு பலவகையான வசதிகளையும் ஏற்படுத்தி கொடுத்துள்ளார்கள். மதுரை சீடு அமைப்பினரின் இந்த தொடர் பயணம் கார்த்திக் அண்ணாவின் அயராத உழைப்பிலும் முழுமூச்சிலும் இருபது ஆண்டுகளைக் கடந்து வந்திருக்கின்றது. அதன் விளைவே இந்த மார்கழி உற்சவம் 2018 குழந்தைகள் திருவிழா. இதற்கு முன்பாக பல நிகழ்வுகள், நாடகங்கள், பயிற்சிப்பட்டறைகள் எனப் பலவற்றை செய்து இருந்தாலும் ஐந்து நாட்கள் கொண்ட நாடக விழா செய்வது இதுவே முதல்முறை.

குழந்தைகள் திருவிழாவிற்கு ஏற்றாற்போல காந்தி மியூசியத்தில் உள்ள குமரப்பா குடிலினை ஒவ்வொரு நாட்களும் வித்தியாசமான முறையில் கிடைப்பவற்றைக் கொண்டு மாற்றியமைத்த விதம் அவர்களுக்குள் இருக்கும் கற்பனை வளத்தினை பறைசாற்றிய ஓர் அம்சமாகும். இவை மட்டுமல்லாது புத்தகக்கடைகள், தீன்பண்டக்கடைகள் என குழந்தைகள் திருவிழா பார்வையாளர்கள் மனதில் வேறொரு தளத்திற்கு சென்றிருக்கும் என்பதில் எவ்வித ஐயப்பாடுகளும் இல்லை. வழமையான நிகழ்வுகள் போல் தலைமை உரை, சிறப்புரை போன்ற ஆரவாரங்கள் எதுவும் இல்லாமல் விளையாட்டு, இராதாகிருஷ்ணனின் குழந்தைகள் பாடல் போன்றவற்றுடன் ஆரம்பமான திருவிழாவின் முதல் நாளில் சென்னை, கனவு வெளியினை சேர்ந்த ஆழி வெங்கடேசன் அவர்களுடைய சிந்துபாத் கடல்பயணம் என்ற ஓராள் நாடகம் ஆற்றுகை செய்யப்பட்டது.

இரண்டாவது நாளினை சிறப்பிக்கும் முகமாக மூன்று ஆற்றுகைகள் கண்களுக்கு விருந்தளிக்கக் காத்திருந்தன. மாலை 4.30 மணி தொடக்கம் 5.30 மணிவரை சிறார்களின் ஆக்கத்திறன் சார்ந்த செயற்பாடுகள் முன்னெடுக்கப்பட்டன. பின்பு கதையும் விளையாட்டும் எனும் தலைப்பினுள் ஆற்றுகை ஒன்றினை நிகழ்த்தியிருந்தார் பெங்களுர், மேஜிக் கார்பெட்டை சேர்ந்த திருமதி.அகிலா அவர்கள். அதனைத் தொடர்ந்து மதுரை சீடு குழந்தைகளின் அன்னை மொழி நிழல் பொம்மலாட்டம் இடம் பெற்றது. இதனைத் நெறிப்படுத்தியிருந்தார் திரு.திலகராஜன் (ஆசிரியர்: மதுரை) அவர்கள். அடுத்த நிகழ்வாக அரங்கேறியது மதுரை சீடு குழந்தைகளுடைய மானுடம் வென்றது என்ற நாடகம் இதனை இயக்கியிருந்தார் திரு.ராஜ்குமார் (ஆசிரியர் : மதுரை)

இவரது ஆற்றுகையினைத் தொடர்ந்து அரங்கேறியது சென்னை, திணைநிலவாசிகள், திரு.பக்ரூதின் அவருடைய நெறியாள்கையில் மதுரை சீடு ஆசிரியத்தொண்டர் ஸ்ரீமான் வாசிம்கான் அவர்களின் நடிப்பில் உருவான வாருங்கள் வண்டவாளங்களை சாப்பிடுவோம் என்னும் ஓராள் நாடகம். இவ்வாறான சிறப்பான ஆற்றுகைகளுடன் இனிதே கழிந்தது நான்காம் நாள்.

அன்றைய நாளின் இரவுப் பொழுதில் அடுத்த நாளிற்கான நிகழ்ச்சிநிரல் பற்றி கலந்துரையாடப்பட்ட போது கார்த்திக் அண்ணா என்னிடம் கேட்டுக் கொண்டார். பத்து நிமிட நாடகம் ஒன்றை மதுரை சீடு பிள்ளைகளை வைத்து உருவாக்கித் தரமுடியுமா? என்று. இதை நான் சற்றும் எதிர்பார்க்கவில்லை. இருப்பினும் அவரது அன்பான வேண்டுகோளுக்கு மறுப்புத் தெரிவிக்க முடியாதவனாய் சந்தோசமாக சம்மதித்துக் கொண்டேன். இது எனக்கு கிடைத்த வாய்ப்பாகக் கருதிக்கொண்டு அதற்கான வேலையில் தீவிரம் காட்டத் தொடங்கினேன். மறுநாள் ஐந்தாவதும் இறுதியுமான மார்கழி உற்சவ குழந்தைகள் திருவிழா சூடுபிடிக்க ஆரம்பித்தது.
